THE PRUSIK KNOT



An extension of the Lark's Head Knot is the Prusik Knot. A friction knot, the Prusik is useful when you want to keep your knot in position



on a ridgeline. I use them in a FS setting to help secure tarps in place to prevent them from sliding. We remember the name by the phrase: Pru's not well. Prusik.
