






PHENOMENAL PHENOLOGY

his term we have been exploring phenology. Simply, phenology is observing nature and the changes that occur in nature as we observe it over time. Practically applying this, we have been using phenology wheels (see right) to make observations over a 6 week period. Weather is something that changes regularly for us providing a good source of content. More subtle changes like more leaves appearing on the trees, or noticing small insects you've never seen before require a closer look. Engaging in this process of observation will hopefully become second nature for our learners and lead them to more discoveries and a deeper appreciation for the natural world as they spend time in nature.

TARP A-FRAME SHELTERS

etting to grips with tarp **J** shelters provided our learners the opportunity to work together in small teams to erect a tarp shelter. Some helped to stretch the tarp while others helped to place the pegs to secure the corners. Great job!



HAPA ZOME

Il our learners had the opportunity to try hapa zome this term. Translating literally as leaf dye, we place leaves between pieces of cotton material and then bash it with a hammer. The chlorophyl and juices from the leaves are released and stain the cotton, leaving an impression of the leaf behind. You can see some incredible detail in this transfer process.

It's an easy process with few resources needed and can provide an opportunity to closer inspect the world of leaves and their intricate veins and patterns.
